At the risk of sounding like a broken record, I hope this finds you staying safe (and sane). As the world outside continues to look uncertain, I want to thank all neighbors for actions they are taking to keep the entire community safe. See below for some top of mind thoughts:

- Safety. We're feeling the increased risk of coronavirus between schools going virtual and tiring mask debates (no comment but if I had one it would be muffled BY MY MASK). We're also hearing of increased police resignations and right or wrong, it will impact how they can cover our communities. I can assure you our patrol continues to do its work and we will evaluate any need for change. Please stay vigilant on all fronts.
- 2. Airbnb Complaints. Over the July 4 weekend we had yet another situation involving police when a neighbor suffered battery from a tenant of a short-term Airbnb rental hosting a party that got out of control. This followed a similar event two months ago on Yorkshire Drive that actually resulted in gun shots. While there may be an acceptable type of rental, we do not want events like these to continue. If you have dealt with a negative experience associated with a short-term Airbnb rental near your home, please contact us with additional information so we can assess the need for more oversight. - 3. The Board Needs YOU. We appreciate all our members immensely and we get such great support from many of you. # Parks

As the summer sun blazes down on our trees, trails, and empty playgrounds, vines, hops, and other weeds wage their endless assault on our greenspaces. Working in pairs or alone, local nature lovers continue the fight to keep our paths and parks healthy and useable. The North Trail through Herbert Taylor Park along Peachtree Creek is widened each week with machete and weed whacker. Friends are tackling Japanese chaff flower before it can mature and release its seed in the fall. Families from local BSA Troop 29 cleared ivy from Lenox-Wildwood. Efforts continue to beat back the jungle from our newly planted milkweed and chestnut.

#### **Milkweeds to Monarchs**

Two years ago, Friends of Herbert Taylor Park and Daniel Johnson Nature Preserve began planting milkweed to encourage the proliferation of monarch butterflies in Morningside Lenox Park. Monarchs, the familiar yellow and black butterflies visit our neighborhood during their migration every year. They are among the most spectacular of all insects, migrating up to 3,000 miles to find just the right temperature and humidity in which to thrive. Lately, biologist have raised concerns as the number of migrating Monarchs has dwindled.

These magnificent insects are attracted to milkweed, both as a source of nectar and as a host. Below is a so-called butterfly weed (Asclepias tuberosa) growing in the Nature preserve where it was planted more than a year ago. As part of the recent Milkweeds to Monarchs initiative, More recently, a group of volunteers planted 20 swamp milkweed, *asclepias incarnata*, on the north shore of Peachtree Creek in the preserve.

As these young plants become established so they can serve as homes for our butterfly friends, it's important that neighborhood adults work to ensure they have a chance to become well established. Do not let your children or pets trample the plants. Most are marked, but you need to keep pets on leash and kids within your purview to protect the tender plants.



If the reader is wondering how to help while visiting our parks, leash your dog and kindly remind others to do the same. We always need help fighting back invasives while not destroying our native plants. If a plant is covering a trail, it can be removed or cut back. If it's privet, ivy, kudzu, or wisteria, it can be removed or cut back. If it barks when touched, it's likely an off-leash dog and should be gently removed.

# **Off Leash Dogs - Please Help!**

MLPA thanks all our neighbors who are heeding the advice of professionals and experts to avoid unnecessary outings, maintain social distance, and wear masks. The astute reader may notice a recurring theme in our newsletters and postings – *leash your dogs!* 

Recognizing we may be preaching to the choir, we ask that neighbors not only be responsible for your own furry animals, but please be active helping to police our parks. If you see an off leash dog, respectfully ask the owner to leash their dog. You can explain the reasons, including fellow visitors' safety and security, the spread of invasives, and *it's the law*. The newly installed signs instruct us to dial 911. Your call will be triaged to avoid wasting resources needed for an emergency, but this situation has gotten out of hand. Let's enjoy our wonderful parks together.

**Back-to-School Supplies Needed for Conant School at Hillside** 

As APS students plan to go back to school virtually for the first 9 weeks, there is one school in the Morningside neighborhood where children will be back in their classrooms next month.

Conant School is a specialized school for children and adolescents struggling with mental health challenges. Located on the campus of Hillside, one of the premier mental health facilities in Georgia for children and young adults, The Conant School provides an environment for Hillside residents to remediate their skill gaps and encourages students to move forward with their education. Children attending The Conant School are also enrolled in the Atlanta Public School system for the duration of their treatment. The Conant School is fully accredited and each child receives credits for the coursework they complete during their stay.

This year they are seeing the impact COVID-19 is having on children's mental health as well as their education. New guidelines discourage sharing of school supplies, so there's an increased need for classroom basics for each student. # **Good Morningside**



#### Airbnbs

Recently, the MLPA has heard numerous complaints about Airbnb short-term rentals in the neighborhood. These complaints involved party noise late at night and in the early morning, parking violations, rowdy behaviors, gun shots, etc. Members of the MLPA Board are investigating city ordinances that might impose restrictions on short term rentals in residential neighborhoods. We could use more data on the extent of Airbnb rentals in the neighborhood to understand the magnitude of the problem. # City of Atlanta Use of Force Advisory Council and Survey
