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## **President's Note**

I hope this email finds you all rapidly vaccinated in the months ahead – if you're anything like me you are starting to trust feeling a little more optimistic and have noticed activity picking up as people feel safer – just please continue to BE safe for the benefit of our neighborhood! Speaking of safety ...

- 1. 911 is there for a reason. We had a lot of neighbors attend our last board meeting with increasing concerns about security and I have had a lot of emails from people basically asking "what is going on?". Although we have said it before, we cannot reiterate enough call 911 anytime you see or hear anything that gives you even the slightest, most uncertain concern. If you are on Wellbourne and can't stand the music reverberating from Onyx, call 911. If you hear gunshots in the distance, call 911. If you see what seems to be a homeless person wandering the street and it makes you nervous or want to make sure they get help, call 911. No situation makes you a nuisance by calling and it tells the City of Atlanta we see things in our neighborhood we don't like and increased call volume data is studied to determine who needs resources. If we call more, we get more attention. Calling is not just about life or death situations it can be even the most uncertain of observations that just makes you feel suspicious. We are in touch with Council Member Ide and APD zone commanders on issues ranging from homeless encampments to increased activity on Cheshire Bridge so they know we feel concerned but squeaky wheels get City of Atlanta grease.
- 2. Get outdoors. Stating the obvious ... spring is here! Looking for a great outdoor activity? There are so many opportunities to volunteer in our parks. Please stay tuned to our Facebook page or our parks committee communications for several opportunities to get outside on Saturday mornings to beautify our green spaces. Many of these are family friendly if you have garden gloves and a little gear and if you would even like us to help create an opportunity for a few families with kiddos, we'd love to figure out the right way to get them involved. # **Master Plan Implementation: Sidewalks**

Volunteer efforts to continue improving and protecting our neighborhood's wonderful assets persist behind the scenes. Particularly timely, as more neighbors find themselves out and about in this warming weather, is the Master Plan Implementation (MPI) Steering Committee's exploration of a sidewalk maintenance program to repair broken and damaged sidewalks. This focus supports the larger goal of providing connections throughout our community so that residents can visit with neighbors, attend school, worship, shop, dine, play or experience nature safely.

Currently, the MPI Steering Committee is brainstorming program ideas to set up a process and plan next steps. Considerations for moving the project forward include permitting (cost, process, timeline), vendor lists, critical need identification (using the MLPWay and sidewalk survey input), procedures for approval and reimbursement, and communication to the neighborhood.

Neighbors can report a variety of issues that require city services, including but certainly not limited to: street flooding, code enforcement, graffiti removal, homelessness outreach, right of way maintenance, street light repair, and so much more. To start this off, we are excited to host Michael Halicki, Executive Director of Park Pride. #### **Other Park News**

Each quarter we will also host a Morningside group to present a local park or effort. In March, John Pappas from the Friends of Sidney Marcus Park, provided an overview of the history and current efforts at their park. This year is the 40th anniversary of the park's founding, which the Friends group will celebrate in late April. We reported last month that the Haygood Happy Camper treated over 30 neighbors to hot chocolate at Sidney Marcus Park. Come out from 3:00-5:00pm on March 20 to enjoy complimentary lemonade, sweet treats and socially distanced enjoyment of Sunken Garden Park. The Friends of Sunken Garden and Lenox-Wildwood Parks will also be there with snacks, plus a kid- (and Covid-) friendly activity. Also on Saturday morning, from 9:00am-12:00pm, help remove invasive plants and debris along the creek in Lenox-Wildwood. Meet at the parking lot on Lenox Rd with your mask, gloves and tools.

Sidney Marcus Park will hold another food drive in conjunction with Intown Collaborative Ministries to collect foodstuffs and deliver it to those in need, from 9:00-11:00am at the kiosk on

April 2 and 3. Canned proteins, fruits, vegetables, cereals are encouraged (they are good on peanut butter and pasta). However, Ultra High Temperature (UHT) or shelf-stable milk, especially in 8 oz containers, is the greatest need right now. Also, mark your calendar for April 24 at 9:00am for a Volunteer Clean Up Day and 40th Anniversary Celebration.

In other Parks Committee news, February saw the first meetings in some time for Friends of Sunken Garden and Lenox Wildwood Parks and Friends of Daniel Johnson and Herbert Taylor Parks, as well as a new working group to study the erosion problem along Peachtree Creek South Fork.

The Parks Committee held a healthy discussion on historic and current efforts for MLPA to obtain tax-exempt status. The Committee supports the formation of a separate 501(c)3 foundation to handle donations and fundraising in support of our parks. There will be a motion presented at next month's MLPA board meeting. # Morningside Awarded Community Impact Grant for Habitat Restoration

A cornerstone of our splendid community is our nature preserves. Nestled along our creeks and floodplains, these natural areas have been a solace in the pandemic and provide recreation for walkers, joggers, and bird watchers. Like so many urban greenlands, Herbert Taylor Park and Daniel Johnson Park have become overgrown with an unsightly mix of invasive vines, shrubs, and the ubiquitous Japanese chaff flower. This loss of native habitat threatens the joy of these parks, the lives of the birds and mammals we cherish, and the value we place on living in Morningside.

Each year the City of Atlanta Department of Planning awards community impact grants to the Neighborhood Planning Units. The grants are intended to improve the quality of life in each neighborhood. You may have noticed the new paint jobs on the utility boxes around Ansley Mall. Last year's grant allowed Piedmont Heights to hire muralists to give some life to otherwise drab parts of our built infrastructure. NPU-F announced this week a \$3,000 grant to fund the purchase of native plants for the trails and woods of Daniel Johnson and Herbert Taylor Parks. As the reader is well aware, volunteers have been working to rid the nature preserve of the destructive, alien plants. The next step in this process is to replace the invasive species with natives which will promote the appropriate habitat for native insects and birds, while supporting erosion control. # Security: Updates from the Atlanta Police Department (APD)

#### Auto Thefts and Break-Ins

There has been a significant downward trend in the last few weeks for both car thefts and breakins. For more than 60% of the cars stolen this year, owners left key fobs in the car or left the car running. In addition, guns are being stolen from cars way too often – 92 so far this year.

Some of the downward trends are being attributed to the work of officers from zones 2, 5, and 6, who have partnered to form an auto break-ins and larceny team. They organize weekly details and are routinely tracking known and repeat offenders. They have identified several locations where the thieves are taking the stolen cars and have been able to make some key arrests.

On Friday March 12, Major Peter Ries (Commander, Zone 6), Major Anthony Singh (Commander, Community Oriented Policing Section (COPS)), Lieutenant Christian Hunt (Quality of Life Officer, Zone 6), Major Rick Vazquez (Security Patrol Lead, MLPA), Brad Schweers (Executive Director, Intown Collaborative Ministries), Karyn Kotler (President, Morningside Place HOA), Mark Smith and Phyllis Wingo (MLPA Board of Directors), and several neighbors met at the back of the Morningside Place community to discuss homelessness in the Morningside Nature Preserve. Of note, the COPS has appreciable resources to address homelessness and quality of life issues in the city, and Intown Collaborative Ministries has a very successful track record in placing homeless persons into housing. The group considered opportunities to work together to offer services to the persons living in the Preserve and ultimately to clean up the sites.

The group then walked into the Preserve to assess the magnitude of the problem. Commander Singh immediately engaged the campers we encountered, provided his contact information, and asked that they please reach out to him. Mr. Schweers was not able to engage, explaining that his program is hesitant to do so in the presence of APD, and unless the program has the capacity to follow-up, which it cannot do at this time.

With regard to expectations, the APD will always respond to calls about specific activities such as crime and fires. An additional complicating factor is that people arrested for remaining in the Preserve "after-hours" are likely to be released with just a citation. The thinking is that, until COVID spread attenuates, these individuals are isolated and have a lower risk of contracting and subsequently spreading the virus by simply remaining where they are. Said differently, this is the "least bad" option. The APD is, however, committed to working with us, and we are in the process of planning a second walk-through to observe the encampments from the Wellbourne side.

## **Street Racing**

Street racing continues to challenge the APD and nearby neighborhoods. ATV 4-wheel vehicles, which are involved in the weekend street racing, get on sidewalks, are difficult to catch, and easily get away. Accordingly, the APD has organized a 4-wheel task force to try to get on top of this issue. During the weekend of March 5-7, the APD street racing detail made 3347 traffic stops, issued 318 citations, made 36 arrests, and impounded 20 vehicles.

## **Water Boys**

The APD has been cracking down on the guys selling water at busy intersections. The Community Oriented Policing Section is maintaining a database of these offenders. The officers are trying to assess why these kids are not in school and are looking into their family circumstances, etc. The goal is to address the underlying problems and get the kids off the streets.

## **Shootings**

Several neighbors have expressed concerns about shootings in Atlanta. In our neighborhood, we are aware of 4 shootings over the past 12 months – one suicide, two at AirB&B party houses, and one at an apartment complex. There have been multiple assaults at the Optimist Lofts, near I-85, some of which have involved shootings.

Otherwise, we do not have shooting incident information by neighborhood. Year to date, 6 shooting incidents occurred in Zone 2 (compared to 10 for 2020 at this time), and 5 have occurred in Zone 6 (compared to 6 for 2020).

# **Solid Waste Services Updates**

#### A Message from our City Council Representative Jennifer Ide's Office:

Unfortunately, the City has continued to have issues meeting the regularly scheduled collection for yard waste and recycling. Solid Waste Services experienced a delay in services due to employees out due to COVID-19 and has had to temporarily change the collection for yard waste and recycling to every-other-week. We understand this is an inconvenience compared to the regular schedule, but we hope that the consistency will allow residents to have a reliable schedule rather than guessing if their bins and bags will be collected.

If you have materials that need to be collected before your collection week arrives there are options for you. Yard trimmings can be dropped off at 2175 James Jackson Parkway NW, Atlanta, GA 30318 on Monday to Friday, 7:30 AM to 4:00 PM. Please remember that if you have more than 20 bags that need to be collected you will need to schedule a bulk collection from 311.

You can deliver recycling materials to CHaRM, the Center for Hard to Recycle Materials. If you are a "super recycler" and are finding the every other week pick up to be a significant impediment, send me an email at jnide@atlantaga.gov, and we may be able to assist with other options.

We appreciate your patience as Solid Waste Services works to get back to its regular collection schedule. To stay informed with updates you can subscribe to Notify ATL or visit the Solid Waste Services webpage. Thank you for your patience as they work to get back to full operational capacity.

#### **Tree Protection Ordinance: In Process Still**

In February, the City Council held a virtual workshop on the updates to the Tree Protection Ordinance. Prior to this meeting, your MLPA Board sent a letter to the council urging the adoption of a stronger ordinance to protect the trees that have lent the moniker "City in the Trees" to Atlanta. Thanks to all the neighbors who attended and took the time to make comments for the workshop. While some progress has been made, it still seems the new ordinance needs improvements to enhance the city's ability to protect our tree canopy.

In the meantime, the destruction of old growth trees continues as developers fell the canopy to make way for development. The Citizen's Group continues to work to improve the ordinance--a copy of their recommended blended ordinance is here. Trees Atlanta is holding a series of workshops to dig into the details of the proposed plan. Their initial opinion of the ordinance is here and a schedule of the four noon-1:00 PM work sessions and topics beginning 3/18 and continuing into April are here. Lastly, City in the Forest is a group that has worked with the Citizen's Group on tree protection and sends out updates on meetings.

The only way we can protect the character of our city is to become informed and voice our opinions to our city council representatives. The resources above can help. # **Morningside Pride and History**

Smith's Olde Bar - technically not part of Morningside Lenox Park but so very close - is one of Atlanta's oldest music venues. It was also just recently named one of the country's top small music venues, claiming the honor for the state of Georgia. Of particular note to our neighborhood, though, is its location in an historic building that houses Atlanta's oldest strip mall. The following are excerpts from an article written 38 years ago by Pat Taylor for the MLPA Newsletter:

The "Morningside Strip could boast eleven tenants" in 1929 according to an article in a 1947 issue of the magazine section of the Atlanta Constitution. Located on Piedmont Road near Ansley Mall, the property originally belonged to A.M. Brockman. Two years after Morningside was annexed to the city of Atlanta (1925), Mr. Albert Heery Bailey purchased this land and the following year began work on what was then called Morningside Shopping Center, the first of its kind in the city of Atlanta.

Mr. Bailey realized that adequate parking was necessary to the success of the shopping center. He tried to purchase the large corner lot owned by Wofford Oil Company (now Clarks Cleaners) and the land where Smith Park is located which was owned by the city. Both attempts were unsuccessful ...

... For many years, angle parking was allowed in front of the shops. Then only parallel parking was permitted. Finally, the city banned parking completely on Piedmont prompting fear among the tenants that their business would suffer. It was imperative that additional parking be found.

We know there are long-time residents who have very fond memories of all the businesses that have called this place home. Who remembers the family-owned Broyles Grocery, which would take charged orders by phone, have an employee deliver them to your (unlocked) home, and put cold items in your refrigerator? Did you enjoy the treats from Rhode's Bakery here in their original location? Do Gene and Gabe's, Piggly Wiggly and the Hickory House spark memories? # Friendly Reminders: Dogs and Sidewalks

As the weather gets warmer and we find ourselves increasingly outside, please consider your neighbors' health and safety. We all enjoy Morningside and appreciate your understanding.

- Please leash your dogs. The city of Atlanta has laws for paws. Under Section 110-70 of the City of Atlanta Code of Ordinances, all dogs must be on a leash when in City of Atlanta parks, trails and public spaces that are not designated dog parks. If you are caught with your dog off a leash, Atlanta Police Officers can cite you. Fulton County Code Enforcement can also take action, as Sec. 34-205 (b) (1) specifically requires dogs be "securely under leash; said leash not being more than six feet long, and under the control of a competent person." In addition, persons with pets must clean up after the pet.
- Kindly use the sidewalks, not the streets. Where possible, please use the sidewalks as you and your families walk/jog/run throughout the neighborhood. Our streets are curvy and hilly, which presents many blind spots for drivers. And we all know that not everyone obeys the speed limits. Let's continue to prevent any serious accidents.

BeltLine-adjacent Amsterdam Walk mulls redevelopment. But first, they want your 2 cents. By Josh Green for Urbanize Atlanta. Long before Ponce City Market and Grant Park's The Beacon, tucked-away Amsterdam Walk was a pioneer on Atlanta's adaptive-reuse development scene. But the eight-acre retail and entertainment district, positioned where tony Virginia-Highland meets well-heeled Morningside, has a problem: A paved Atlanta BeltLine corridor is coming, and as it's currently configured, Amsterdam Walk is facing east. In other words, the former industrial hub is putting its back to the BeltLine. As a tentative first step that could spell redevelopment, the district's owner of 35 years, Atlanta-based Halpern Enterprises, has recently been gathering community input for an initiative called "Reimagine Amsterdam Walk." Police Reform and Public Safety Survey Now Available on Survey Monkey. The City of Atlanta has partnered with Urban Planning and Management, LLC, for the Citywide Police Reform and Public Safety Survey. The survey enables all residents and those who work in Atlanta to express their views and perceptions of public safety and police reform. As a part of the broader police reform initiative, the survey aligns with Mayor Keisha Lance Bottoms' commitment to effectively reduce crime while building public trust by building lasting, healthy relationships between law enforcement and the communities they serve. Preliminary stakeholder interviews inclusive of community leaders and Atlanta Police Department officers - contributed to developing the community survey. The results from the stakeholder interviews and the survey which can be found online here - will guide future community engagement and operational recommendations. The Citywide Police Reform Survey is based on the U.S. Department of Justice's Community Survey on Public Safety and Law Enforcement, which was developed under the Obama Administration. 
