President's Note

What did I tell you last month? That went fast - and here we are again.

- **1. School survey results.** Thank you to the 450+ neighbors who participated in our survey about the future of Morningside Elementary School (MES). There are more details below but 81% of respondents opposed the recommendation by Atlanta Public Schools to make Inman a 4th/5th academy, which would make MES a K-3 program. Although we will leverage the data to work with city leaders to get more insight into neighborhood impacts, below are also ways you can reach APS and Board of Education decision-makers if you'd like to express your own opposition or support.
- 2. Annual meeting recap. In our meeting last Monday we voted on a new board for 2022, welcoming three new members to the team in roles such as parks and traffic. We are always glad to have new neighbors join us! We also voted on updates to the by-laws, which will be available on the MLPA website. One notable change is that we now have a 4-year term limit on presidents, which means 2022 will be my last year in this role. While we have many capable people on the board, we're going to need a new generation of volunteers to get involved to ensure transition of initiatives in the years ahead and we have a lot of committees across security, zoning and parks to help you get involved at your own pace. We do not want to be in a position this time next year with turnover and no one to fill the spots. We also approved a new digital speed reader for Wellbourne Drive that was recommended in our master plan with the ongoing Cheshire Bridge detour, we hope this will help that area relieve the pressure of increased traffic and speeding.
- **3. Show your holiday spirit.** We have a lot of opportunities to support others this season including supporting a toy drive with Atlanta Police Department and co-hosting Winterfest with Virginia-Highlands on December 4. Details below! The MLPA will also be doing its annual gift card distribution to the local fire station and police precinct that supports us.

We are still monitoring the License Review Board agendas for its review of the alcohol license application for Octopus Kitchen and Bar. It was scheduled for November 9 but suddenly removed from the agenda – when we have more details we'll share. Regarding the homicide outside Loca Luna in Amsterdam Walk on October 24, we have been made aware that an arrest warrant is out for the suspect.

And as if you don't have enough to do, don't forget to VOTE in the runoff elections on November 30! We are looking forward to new direction, particularly on the public safety front. As always please reach out with feedback – hope you all are looking forward to a less-virtual but safe Thanksgiving.

Future of Morningside Elementary

Thank you to the 450+ residents who took our survey last week regarding the recommendation by Atlanta Public Schools (APS) to make Inman a 4th/5th academy, which would result in Morningside Elementary School (MES) and other elementary schools in the Midtown High cluster becoming K-3 programs in fall 2023. If you still have not taken the survey, it is available here.

As an elementary parent myself I am sure we can count on our strong community to rally around our students and our schools no matter what form MES takes in the coming years. That being said, the results indicate overwhelming opposition to this recommendation. With healthy representation across current parents, future parents and residents who do/will not have K-5 children, 81% oppose the recommendation while only 9% support it. Reasons in the comments range from academic and social concerns, impact on traffic from additional buses/longer school commutes, the fact the new Inman building would not provide enough capacity for students within three years resulting in higher costs, and disruption to families with several children. Some examples of feedback both against and for the recommendation follow:

- It is disappointing APS made this recommendation without taking into account the feedback from the community (spoken from someone who attended the community engagement meetings dating back to 2019)
- This proposal is a bandaid that causes almost, if not more, problems than it solves. I appreciate the effort that went into it but it does not make sense.
- I think a dual elementary school (for MES or Spark) would be a much better option. Other schools in Atlanta like Sarah Smith and Jackson already have dual elementary campuses which are much less disruptive.... This is already a proven, successful model.
- We moved our kids from APS due to superintendent changes and virtual school. Our current school has K-3, 4-6, and I have noticed how well the 4th graders fit in this environment. They are older, more pre-teen than K-er, and I think it's a good time for a change.
- Our child went to MES and it was a wonderful experience. It was in 5th grade where we saw her confidence boosted to new levels and that has made the transition to middle school so much better. I believe pulling kids in 4th grade from one school and putting them in another would be disruptive to the way children mature and grow confidencewise.
- Please do not split K-3 and 4/5 into two separate locations. We have 3 children and this
 will affect our decision to continue with APS. If the 4/5 Academy goes forward, we will be
 forced to pull our children and go to private school for logistical and academic concerns. I
 do not feel the 4/5 academy benefits the Morningside community and will cause disruption
 and decreased engagement within the school district.

The MLPA will work to reflect the feelings of the neighborhood and engage with city leaders to make sure the community as a whole is represented in this decision, which is expected to happen in an Atlanta Public Schools Board of Education meeting in Q1 2022. We will also consider a new education committee to help with the communication and workload that will be involved.

Do you have a little red and white yard sign that shows your house number? If not, why not?


Morningside is very lucky to have an excellent, well-run private patrol in the neighborhood. The Morningside Security Patrol is 100% supported by members of the Morningside Lenox Park Association (MLPA) and staffed by off-duty Atlanta police officers who know our neighborhood very well and are committed to keeping us safe. And yet, the patrol is supported by less than 25% of the neighborhood. That's right, only about 25% of our neighborhood pays to have APD officers patrol our streets, call in suspicious situations, and catch 911 calls when on duty. While most of us have security systems, and the police response can be slow, these guys KNOW what is going on in Morningside. We need them particularly now at a time when our police departments are under-staffed and morale is low. See more about the patrol below.*

In addition, but no less important, the MLPA supports many other community activities. The MLPA is behind concerts and movies in the park, park renewal and restoration (think Sidney Marcus and Herbert Taylor), meet the candidates for local elections, participation in the NPU and city License Review Board meetings, newsletters providing pertinent up-to-date information about the renovation of Morningside Elementary School and the rebuilding of the bridge on Cheshire Bridge, implementation of projects identified by the Master Plan adopted by the City in 2018, etc.

*The Morningside Security Patrol is primarily staffed by officers who have worked with us for several years. They conduct vacation checks for Security Plus members who are out of town. The Patrol checks their houses once a day for newspapers in the driveway, trashcans in the street, packages visible on front steps or porch, or anything that seems suspicious, or out-of-place. They send an email once a day to report that all is well or a specific issue.

QR tags have been installed in 98 locations around the neighborhood to maximize coverage in all quadrants. Specific locations were selected and optimized with the help of software technology and the officers on patrol. When the officers drive around, they scan these locations. All locations are scanned every 48 hours, with most scanned more than once. So, they can tell you specifically when they were last on your street.



Cheshire Bridge Demolition

Last week, demolition of the bridge on Cheshire Bridge Road began.

Excerpts from the <u>ATLDOT News Release</u>, <u>November 4</u>:

The City of Atlanta Department of Transportation (ATLDOT) announced utility relocation work is complete on the fire-damaged Cheshire Bridge over South Fork Peachtree Creek, clearing the way for demolition work to begin ...

... The bridge was closed to traffic after a fire severely compromised its safety and efficacy in August of this year. A demolition contractor was selected in late September and vendors have been working to move power, water, gas, cable and phone lines off the bridge and around the construction zone.

"We are grateful for the patience and continued support of the local community in the face of the tremendous inconvenience caused by the Cheshire Bridge closure," said ATLDOT Commissioner Josh Rowan. "Issues encountered during the utility relocation process have delayed the start of demolition, but work should progress well from this point."

The designated contractor will work seven days a week on a 24-hour-a-day schedule to complete the demolition. This aggressive schedule will ensure the safety of the public, while preparing the bridge for construction in 2022.

"We are currently preparing a bid package for design and construction and expect to have a contractor on board soon after demolition is complete," Rowan said. "We remain committed to getting the bridge demolished and replaced as safely and quickly as possible."

Yard Debris Collection Updates

Last month, the Commissioner of Public Works addressed yard debris pickup concerns with NPU Chairs. You can view the presentation from Public Works here, and the following are take-aways provided by our NPU-F Chair:

- They are sincerely working on it. Many problems have been caused with the labor shortage and their inability to recruit the number of employees that are needed (they've hired 40 but need more) despite using cash and other incentives. Office staff have been reassigned as truck drivers until they can get staffed up and caught up. New employees are not familiar with some of the neighborhoods and miss some of the streets. Temp agencies are not interested in supplying workers because of the liability with work that requires folks to hang off a truck.
- One of the problems discussed is how the truck routing has worked. Once the truck is full
 with debris, they leave the route and travel to the only City dump site which is on the
 Atlanta/Cobb border. Sometimes that happens in the middle of the block. Usually they
 don't return to where they left off because of the travel distance.
- The City has antiquated trucks, systems and processes that they are working to update.
 They are buying new software that will do a better job scheduling routes and 8 new trucks that will only require one person. They are also looking to expand the number of dump sites to different parts of the city.
- The Commissioner says that if your yard waste hasn't been picked up in 3 weeks, it's not
 on their radar. You may put it in your regular trash until they can get the system fixed. It
 won't be recycled, but it won't be sitting on the street.
- They have hired two landscape companies to pick up yard waste. They will be in marked trucks and focusing on the areas that have been most neglected.

Street Captain Meet and Greet

On Saturday, November 13, at Sidney Marcus Park, Stephanie Aron (MLPA's Neighborhood Watch Lead), Sue McHale, and Camille Richardson hosted a meet & greet event for all MLPA street captains. The weather was cool, but a dazzling sun brilliantly lit the tree leaves with fall colors invigorating all attendees.

The meet & greet provided a perfect opportunity for street captains to meet each other, to share experiences, to exchange ideas and specially to receive a much deserved thank you. The event included special guests Phyllis Wingo (MLPA Security Chair) and Rick Vasquez (MLPA Security Patrol Lead), who provided contemplative security insights, such as the reason why the majority of cars are stolen is because keys are left in the car or the unlocked car is left with engine running.

Discussion also included ideas on how to quickly inform neighbors of potential safety issues. One idea offered is having multiple adjacent streets join together in using a listserv email system that makes it possible for participating residents to send real-time alerts to each other. The Beech Valley and Pasadena streets have implemented this method of communication with 85% of their residents participating. Neighborhood Watch is also looking into using text messaging as a way to quickly warn MLP residents of nearby crime incidents -- Be On the Look Out (BOLO alerts.)

Our community's street captains are the foot soldiers of the Neighborhood Watch Program. Along with stay-at-home Moms, persons working at home, and retirees, they are the eyes on the streets who can report suspicious goings on. They have volunteered to assist their neighbors, the MLPA and the police in monitoring the safety and security of their streets. They deserve a big shout-out and thank you from the entire neighborhood.

For the Neighborhood Watch Program to have continued success, its team needs help in finding street captains on streets that are currently without. If someone is looking for a great way to meet their neighbors, perform meaningful work, and give back to our wonderful MLP neighborhood, being a street captain is the answer. One of the first insights a street captain realizes is that you meet so many wonderful, helpful, concerned neighbors - which not only leads to safer streets, but also long-lasting friendships.


Fall Concert Series Recap

State House Representative Updates

We appreciate that our House District 57 Representative Stacey Evans - and/or members of her staff - attend our monthly board meetings. Please see the latest updates from our meeting last week:

- On Tuesday, November 9, the new State House Map (<u>HB 1EX</u>) was passed out of the House Legislative & Congressional Reapportionment Committee—less than one week after being released to the public. Then, the very next day, the map passed out of the full House. On Friday, the Senate adopted the map. It is now on its way to the Governor for signature. You can view a copy of the map <u>HERE</u>. MLPA will remain in District 57 from what we can see. We will have a new district by the next MLPA meeting!

Morningside Nature Preserve

City of Atlanta Parks has temporarily closed the Morningside Nature Preserve (MNP) suspension bridge for repairs. The bridge's current condition is a serious safety hazard.

Without the bridge, MNP is divided into two parts on either side of South Fork Peachtree Creek. To reach the east side of South Fork Peachtree Creek (stairs, boardwalk, beach area), use the Lenox Road entrance. To reach the west side of South Fork Peachtree Creek trails, use the Wellbourne Drive entrance or the unmarked Wildwood entrance. Please plan accordingly.







Herbert Taylor and Daniel Johnson Parks

From the Friends of Herbert Taylor Park and Daniel Johnson Park (HTDJ):

Prehistoric Morningside

Thousands of years ago, humans lived in our neighborhood. On Saturday, some of our amateur archaeologist-neighbors led a walk to Dog Wallow, Georgia Archaeological Site #9-DA413, at the confluence of Rock Creek and South Fork Peachtree Creek in Herbert Taylor Park. John Mayes brought along some of his collection of projectile points and pottery shards shown above. He and Ansley Abraham are regularly down at the creek after rains when artifacts come to the surface. Over the past two decades, these two have developed an 'eye' for ancient items that sometimes surface.

We were all amazed at the variety and intricacy of the items on display. The oldest are from the Archaic period, 8000 BC-1000 BC! These ancient tools and bowl fragments are testament to the people who hunted and gathered in our area thousands of years ago. Many of the projectile points and more detailed pottery date to the Woodlands period (1000 BC-1000 AD). It was fascinating to see the various pieces that illustrated the evolving sophistication of the artists. The Archaic pieces were mostly utilitarian, but those from the Woodlands feature decorations, beginning with punctations, then fabric pressings, then what is known as Swift Creek complicated stamped pieces where elaborate wood carvings were pressed into the moist clay before firing.

Our early neighbors engaged in trade, acquiring materials from the coastal plain and the mountains—as the projectile points made of chert attest. Almost all of the artifacts we viewed were made long before the first Europeans came into our area. It certainly provides a new perspective on the history of our neighborhood. From the Friends of Sidney Marcus Park:

Groundbreaking and Food Drive

After a long wait for permission from the City of Atlanta and the Department of Parks and Recreation, renovation at Sidney Marcus Park will begin in December. Expected to last 3-5 months, this is a milestone for the community and the effort of Friends of Sidney Marcus Park (FSMP) that began in 2017. By the group, the MLPA and the neighborhood raising over \$100,000, FSMP was awarded a Legacy Grant from Park Pride, matching the neighborhood investment. The upcoming renovation is slated to cost \$200,000 and will focus on drainage, erosion control and watershed management. Based on the FSMP Vision Plan, it is the first major step towards realizing the vision for the park.

What has been a yearlong delay due to Covid, groundbreaking on this project will begin in early December. A celebration will be held at the park at **11am on Saturday**, **December 11**. This festive event will have live music and offer the opportunity to review the renovation plans, discuss next steps, learn the history of the park and meet the core team behind this project and FSMP

That same weekend, the groundbreaking event will cap off the 5th quarterly Sidney Marcus Park Food Drive from **9 to 11am on Friday and Saturday, December 10 and 11**. During the Pandemic, FSMP found a way to safely rally the neighborhood with quarterly food drives at the park. To date, FSMP, in collaboration with Intown Collaborative Ministries, has collected over 5,000 pounds of food and personal hygiene products. The group hopes to capture the holiday spirit and bring the community together in support of those in need. Personal hygiene products and canned proteins, fruits, peanut butter, vegetables, cereals, and pasta are items most requested.

Zoning

Time to engage in zoning! The department of City Planning has started the public process for its multi-year Zoning Ordinance rewrite, ATL Zoning 2.0 on November 3, 2021. They need YOUR input and involvement! Join them as they kick-off the rewrite process with a series of virtual meetings, "Idea Labs," presented as food for thought on topics that shape the new Zoning Ordinance. It's time for a new set of rules. Register today.

Recent events have demonstrated a strong interest in the City's plans in this area. We need to be at the table to provide input based on the specific needs of our neighborhood. NPU-F recently voted to oppose the DCP proposal for changes to the Comprehensive Development Plan and Amir Farokhi zoning legislation. These proposals were largely opposed on the grounds of the process and lack of community engagement. This is our chance to change that process for the better.

Four zoning case were heard in November by the Zoning Committee and MLPA Board:

- V-21-221 1039 Reeder Circle NE
 - Applicant seeks a special exception from the zoning regulation 1) allow active recreation in a yard adjacent to a street (High Point Place) in order to install a swimming pool in the side yard and 2) exceed the maximum height of a fence in the front yard from 4 feet to 5 feet for the construction of a privacy fence in the front yard where it is otherwise prohibited.
 - Approved
- V-21-236 1972 Wellbourne Drive NE
 - Applicant seeks a variance from the zoning regulation to reduce the required south side yard setback from 10 feet to 7.4 feet in order to construct an addition onto an existing single-family residence.
 - Approved
- V-21-275 1729 Lenox Road NE
 - Applicant seeks a variance from the zoning regulations to 1) reduce the required south side yard setback from 10 feet to 6 feet, 2) increase the allowable cumulative floor area of all accessory buildings from 30 percent to 80 percent of the main structure in order to construct a new accessory building.
 - Approved
- 21-286 1174 Cumberland Road NE
 - Applicant seeks a variance from the zoning regulation to reduce the required west

- side yard setback from 7 feet to 1 foot for the purpose of constructing a new detached garage.
- Approved

The next zoning meeting will be held online via Zoom on November 7 at 7:00 pm. Any neighbors interested in variance outcomes should come to these meetings.
